Charles R. Westgate Scholarship in Engineering in the Whiting School of Engineering

The Charles R. Westgate Scholarship in Engineering, a merit-based scholarship, provides full tuition for four years of undergraduate study in engineering. Students in any engineering major may be considered for the scholarship. Up to two scholarships are available for entering students each year.

The scholarship is made possible through a gift from Kwok-leung Li, a graduate of the Electrical and Computer Engineering Department, who achieved great success as an entrepreneur in the communications and network industries. The scholarship is named in honor of former Hopkins professor Charles R. Westgate, who has dedicated his career to the education of undergraduate students. Dr. Westgate has been widely recognized for his excellence in teaching and his interest in helping students in research and guided study.

In making his gift to the Whiting School of Engineering at Johns Hopkins, Mr. Li said that he is honoring Dr. Westgate because he wanted everyone to know “how much students at Hopkins value good teaching and caring teachers.” The Westgate Scholarship is designed to bring to Johns Hopkins the most outstanding engineering undergraduate students found anywhere.

Eligibility

To be considered for this award, students must:

1. Apply for freshman admission to the Whiting School of Engineering at Johns Hopkins University by January 1.
2. Present an outstanding high school record and achievements in other areas including leadership, success in science fairs, and evidence of independent research.

A Scholarship Committee selects finalists from among qualified applicants; no formal application is needed. Notification of selection as a finalist is made at the time of admission. Westgate finalists are invited to campus to participate in the final selection process, and notification is given to the recipient(s) shortly thereafter.

The Westgate Scholarship may be renewed for up to three additional years of undergraduate study based on:

1. Continued enrollment in the Whiting School of Engineering.
2. Maintenance of at least a 3.0 GPA.

Woodrow Wilson Undergraduate Research Fellowship Program in the Krieger School of Arts & Sciences

Initiated through the insight and generosity of trustee and alumnus J. Barclay Knapp, the Woodrow Wilson Undergraduate Research Fellowship Program is a unique program designed for undergraduates who believe that, of all academic endeavors, research offers the greatest intellectual challenge and reward. Students who are excited by the prospect of doing original research under the mentorship of world-class faculty members should seek the Wilson Research Fellowship. Fellowships are awarded to incoming freshmen and to rising sophomores.

The Program's Main Elements

1. Throughout their undergraduate years, Wilson Research Fellows work closely with faculty mentors on research projects.
2. The fellowship provides up to \$10,000 to 15 freshmen (up to \$7,500 to five sophomores) in the support of research expenses—including relevant travel, equipment, and use of archives or laboratories. (The fellowship does not count as financial aid.)
3. Students pursue research throughout their tenure at Hopkins. In the spring of their senior year, Wilson Research Fellows present their research results to the Hopkins community.
4. Throughout their time at Hopkins, a Wilson Research Fellow may choose to work within one field, focusing on a single long-term project or exploring several aspects of that field. Or, the Wilson Research Fellow may prefer to undertake projects in totally diverse areas of study.

Eligibility

Eligibility is limited to students applying as undergraduate freshmen and to current first-year students in the Krieger School of Arts & Sciences. Selection of Wilson Research Fellows is based on academic merit and the strength of applicants' proposals for projects. Students eligible for this program are those who demonstrate an active interest in conducting their own research.

To be considered for the Woodrow Wilson Undergraduate Research Fellowship Program in the Krieger School of Arts & Sciences as an incoming freshman, please respond by completing and returning the program application on the back of this page along with your application for admission. Notification of selection will be made at the time of admission.
